COVID-19 UPDATES

Effective May 26, CSU Pueblo returned to [full-in-person operations](#), retaining some hybrid services as needed. Campus is currently operating at full capacity, including in the Recreation Center, across athletics, and for all external events: camps, clinics, auxiliary services, and summer academic programming.

As of August 13, CSU Pueblo remains in active “outbreak” status, with our last, reported, positive case on August 12. As of this date, we have had 1 “breakthrough” cases among vaccinated individuals, though none has been hospitalized. Point-of-care testing continues at the Wolfpack Wellness Center. As of July 30, we have received over 900 [voluntary vaccination records](#) from employees and students.

On August 6, an email was sent to all CSU Pueblo campus community members, from President Mottet, reaffirming campus fall 2021 plans, strongly encouraging mask wearing for all (regardless of vaccination status), and reminding everyone to submit vaccine records.

CENTER FOR INTEGRATED HEALTH AND HUMAN INQUIRY DONOR CELEBRATION

Colorado State University Pueblo Foundation hosted a donor reception to recognize the philanthropic contributions supporting the Center for Integrated Health and Human Inquiry (CIHHI) building, formerly the Psychology building, which opened August of 2020. The CIHHI supports the various disciplines of Human Health, Nursing, Social Sciences, and the Humanities. Additionally, it will now host the Wolf Pack Wellness Center and the Counseling Center available for the health needs of the campus community. CIHHI offers collaborative spaces, nursing simulation labs, and distance learning classrooms which supports inclusion and access for CSU Pueblo.

The reception held on Aug. 3, in the foyer of the Center for Integrated Health and Human Inquiry included a short program recognizing the significant financial contributions of Parkview Health System, Dr. Jarvis and Mary Jo Ryals, the family of former CSU Pueblo President, Joseph Garcia, and other donors who have helped enhance the facility.
