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Course Description and Purpose: This course will discuss the social and psychological issues and challenges facing Chican@s. We will address issues of economic inequality, lack of political representation, educational inequity, and identity. We will also address strengths of Chicano Communities and how to apply academic ideas into community conversation. Students will review current research on the social and psychological areas addressing Chican@s.

Expected Learning Outcomes: Upon completion of the course students will be able to

- 1. Discuss the complexities of ethnicity and identity for Chicanos.
- 2. Describe the impact of social, economic and political structures in the United States on a Chicano population .
- 3. Describe the current social and psychological health of Chicanos in the United States.
- 4. Discuss the impact of individuals, religious institutions, and political structures on Chicanos and their communities.

- D. Film responses- Students will watch 4 films during the semester. Students are to answer questions for each film. **100 points**
- E. Discussion- Students will lead one discussion over a topic of their choice: More information to be posted later. **200 Points**
- F. Final Presentation Students will present on a topic of their choice. 250 points
