In September, CSU Pueblo announced that it will participate in the Presidential Fellows program. This program will afford students the opportunity to study the United States Presidency and policy making. CSU Pueblo has announced that Justin Kurth will be the school's first ever Presidential Fellow. "I am humbled to the be the first Presidential Fellow from CSU Pueblo," Kurth said. "It means a lot to me that I get to be one of the voices that will be at the table." A junior in the Political Science program, Kurth served in the Marine Corps for five years. Since his time in the Marines, Kurth has been politically active, lobbying as a civilian for reform on campaign finance. With his Presidential Fellowship, Kurth hopes to focus on establishing a peaceful US presence in



outer space that will help the country keep up with competing foreign powers. Thanks to the support from Dr. Malik and Seeme Hasan, CSU Pueblo is one of just 35 universities nationwide that sponsor the Presidential Fellows Program. CSU Pueblo is the only public university in the state of Colorado offering this program and one of just nine public universities in the United States that support the Presidential Fellows Program. "This fellowship means that I will be able to advance my career in an accelerated way, which is pivotal for a nontraditional student."
